The Best Give Exchange Ever

The year 2020 will be remembered as a year of great distress. Here is a list of some of the things that have happened during this year in the United States.

- The Covid-19 pandemic has nearly shut down the country, kept people isolated in their homes, and has killed 260,000 people to date in the USA.
- The sitting president is impeached by the House and acquitted by the Senate.
- March 9 of this year suffered the worst single-day drop in the history of the stock market.
- The Black Lives Matter protests that were sometimes hijacked by people intent to do violence.
- Murder hornets arrive in the United States.
- West coast wildfires that burned millions of acres and displaced hundreds of thousands of people.
- The death of a supreme court justice (Ruth Baber Ginsburg).
- A presidential election that ended with a contested result.

On top of these national events, there have been many private tragedies in people's lives. People have suffered sickness, lost family members, and become unemployed. It is no wonder that some cities have measured 70% increases in suicides this past year.

I share these very discouraging events as a way of reminding you that this is the type of world that Jesus was born into. No matter how beautiful paintings may make the ancient world look, the people then were like people of today. They, too, suffered depression, anxiety, fear, and the constant threat of sickness or loss. They, too, suffered under competing political claims and unexpected earthquakes, fires, and floods. They, too, longed for a better world.



This longing for a better world and recognizing that God fulfills this longing through Christ is a large part of what makes Christmas meaningful to me.

Celebrating the Christmas season is not a momentary escape or distraction from the hurt and pain of this world but is a reminder of God stepping into the hurt and pain of this world. Christmas is where I am reminded that God remembers His children (He remembers you) and fulfills the promises of His faithful love. Christmas is the reminder that there is

no hurt, pain, humiliation, distress, or agony that we may experience that our God does not also share. The Lord did not just enter our world; He entered our suffering and grief. This is what the Bible tells us in Isaiah 53:4, "*Surely he has borne our griefs, and carried our sorrows.*" We (you) are not alone; God has come into our world to carry our griefs!

Thus, here is a spiritual exercise that I would like you to practice this season. Just as you purchase and wrap gifts for those you love, think of giving God a

gift. What do you have that God wants you to give to Him? He wants you to give Him your griefs and sorrows. In prayer, picture yourself taking whatever hurt and pain you have and then place it in a box and hand it to Jesus. "*Here, Lord, are the burdens I carry.*" Jesus will take this "gift" from you. Not only will He take it, but He will also, in turn, give you a gift. He gives you the gifts of joy everlasting, life eternal, the forgiveness of sins, and His Spirit poured out upon you. This is the best gift exchange you will ever experience; exchange gifts with Jesus this season. Do not hoard your grief or worry but give it to Him and enjoy His gifts in return.

Matthew 4:16 says “the people dwelling in darkness have seen a great light, and for those dwelling in the region and shadow of death, on them a light has dawned”



What great hope is couched in this verse. Imagine the deep longing for light if you are surrounded by darkness. This promise from the Old Testament provided hope for the dawning life of the Messiah who would come after seasons of great trial. Sound familiar?

If you're like me, this year has been rough as we have dealt with fears, anxieties, unknowns, and constant changes. That phrase “looking for light at the end of the tunnel” seems so timely. This promise from the Old Testament that Matthew writes is realized in Jesus gives us hope that even through dark seasons of life, God does not leave us alone and without hope.

Advent is a season of waiting and preparing for Christmas, the birth of Jesus. Notes from the Choir Director, Karen Dailey

To say Advent season is special is quite the understatement. There is a sense of wonderment and awe as we prepare our homes and hearts for the upcoming celebration of Christ's birth. Throughout this time, if you focus on the words of all the Christmas carols being sung you will find that many are proclaiming the gospel. A lot of the traditional carols we sing today date back to the 18th and 19th centuries and are rich with scriptural truths. I have enjoyed reading the history of these hymns. They often began as poems then later were set to tunes that were familiar at the time. People like Martin Luther (*Away in a Manger*), Charles Wesley (*Hark the Herald, Angels Sing*), Isaac Watts (*Joy to the World*), James Montgomery (*Angels, From the Realms of Glory*) found a way to bring Christmas hymns to the masses making them the people's carols. Additionally, many of today's Christmas hymns are also full of gospel truths. We just need to focus on the words to hear the meaning behind them. This year, our traditional Christmas cantata will be replaced by various family groups or individuals sharing a plethora of both traditional and contemporary Christmas hymns along with the scriptures that tie them all together telling the true story of Christmas. It is our sincere desire that Christ will be glorified through the program on December 13th and that all hearing the program will be blessed by it. We will share with both services on that Sunday morning and the 11 o'clock service will be live streamed on New Baptist Facebook page. May you each be blessed by the sounds of the season as you reflect on God's promises fulfilled in Christ's birth.





Family traditions around the holidays are the foundation of many memories. For me, we gathered with my dad’s brothers and their families at my grandparents on Christmas Eve. First in our activities was my grandfather reading the Christmas story from Luke’s gospel. When my grandparents died, we lost our gathering place and things changed. My parents began to host Christmas Eve, but some family did not travel to come. We still began the evening with the reading of the Christmas story, only now it was my dad who read.

It was the first Christmas after my father’s death, some 36 years ago now, and I remember it like it was yesterday. The empty seat at the table and another voice reading the Christmas story on Christmas Eve to the family. Those memories are still alive, even though the holidays are not the same. For years now we have attended a Christmas Eve service at church and then gathered after Christmas as family. God, though, is faithful and has filled those holidays with other joys called children, grandchildren, family, and friends. I am who I am today in large part because of the foundation of faith laid in me by my father and I now get to lay that foundation of faith in others.

2020 has brought its own challenges and continues to affect how we gather and interact with each other. Add to that the suffering that comes from grief and loss and it is no wonder the magic of the holidays is missing for many people this year. Bright lights with the sounds of music do not always lift heavy hearts. We invite you to a [service of HOPE on Monday, December 21st at 6:30 pm](#). Some call this service “A Blue Christmas” others call it “The Longest Night” but here at New Baptist we call it “Hope for the Holidays.”

If you would like a time of quiet reflection, prayer and focusing your thoughts on the Savior who was born then join us in this service honoring and remembering our losses in an atmosphere of faith, hope, and love. Because of covid the service will be different this year, scaled back some. We will continue to use the safety protocols already in place for our in-person meetings. It is our prayer that you will leave with your spirit renewed experiencing anew the most joyful news ever announced, “A Savior is born...”

This is an opportunity for you to invite a friend who is grieving and walk with them on their journey. Your friendship and this service might just be the best gift they receive this year.



Why Give Back to God? (reprinted from article by Community Christian Church) (I shared this in last year's newsletter but I felt it was worth sharing again.)

Giving our tithes and offerings reflects a grateful heart that wants to give back to God a portion of what He has given us; in reality, what is already His. This is our opportunity to show God that He is first in our lives. The Bible says, the purpose of tithing is to teach you always to put God first in your lives (Deuteronomy 14:23 TLB). Tithing is a reminder that God is the supplier of everything we have. It is also God's personal invitation to an outpouring of His blessing in your life.

Four reasons to give back to God

- **Giving is a Reflection of the Heart:**

Matthew 6:20-21 "Store up for yourselves treasures in heaven... For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

What's the most important thing to you? We see the way our culture encourages us to store up treasures on earth and exalts materialism to the point where debt has become acceptable. We can probably even recognize that truth by looking at our own checkbooks. As Christ-followers, however, we are called to free ourselves from the bondage of debt so that our resources are available for His purposes.

- **Giving is a Reflection of Priorities:**

Long before tithing was a practice of the Israelite people, Cain and Abel, the 2nd generation of the human race, brought an offering to the Lord. Abel brought the "firstborn of his flock," while Cain brought "some of the fruits of the soil." The Lord blessed Abel's offering, but rejected Cain's. God wants to be first in our lives.

Deuteronomy 26:1-2 "When you have entered the land the LORD your God is giving you as an inheritance and have taken possession of it and settled in it, take some of the firstfruits of all that you produce from the soil of the land and present them to the LORD your God." (NIV)

- **Giving is a Privilege:**

The 1st Century church modeled for us what it means to give generously and joyfully so that more and more people could find their way back to God.

2 Corinthians 8:2-4 "Out of the most severe trial, their overflowing joy and their extreme poverty welled up in rich generosity. For I testify that they gave as much as they were able, and even beyond their ability. Entirely on their own, they urgently pleaded with us for the privilege of sharing in this service to the saints." (NIV)

- **Giving is a Blessing:**

God uses the tithe as an investment where everyone involved gets a return. If we are blessed beyond our needs, it is not for the purpose of living more lavishly but to bless others. The church and the kingdom are blessed, and yet God's nature is to also bless the giver.

Malachi 3:10 "Bring the whole tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. Test me in this," says the LORD Almighty, "and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it." (NIV)

Finally, **Bob** was seen in the opening and closing parts of the Marshall University television production *A Change of Seasons* honoring the 75 Marshall football team members as well as coaches, townspeople, and airplane personnel who perished in the November 14, 1970, tragic crash of the plane carrying the returning team and friends. **Grover Tadlock** was the Chief Photographer for the production.

Charitable Giving while Shopping

For those of you who regularly shop on Amazon you can also use your shopping to help benefit New Baptist ministries. All users have to do is to visit smile.amazon.com (amazon.com and Amazon mobile app purchases do not apply) to earn 0.5 percent of their eligible purchases for their favorite nonprofit or cause.

AmazonSmile is very simple to use—all you need is an Amazon account. On your first visit to the site, you will be asked to log in to your Amazon account with existing username and password (you do not need a separate account for AmazonSmile). You can then choose New Baptist Church as the charity you wish to support. During future visits to the site, AmazonSmile will remember your charity and apply eligible purchases towards your total contribution.

If you plan on doing any Christmas shopping online with Amazon and like the idea of a percentage of your purchases coming back to the church as charitable giving you might want to try this out.
