Being a Blessing

Many years ago, I came across a saying attributed to Augustine of Hippo that went something like this; “There are three reasons why people seek education. First, they want to show how smart they are to everyone else. Second, they seek education out of love for learning. And third, they seek education and learning for the purpose to better serve others.” I have always liked Augustine's saying because it shows the importance of investing in one's own growth and development as an important part of caring for others. Or, to say this differently, you are as much (or more) a blessing to others in who you are versus what you do. Or, to say this as Jesus would say it, “First clean the inside of the cup and dish, and then the outside also will be clean (Matthew 23:26).” We bless others when we ourselves are whole, holy, and healthy.

This principle of self-care and learning can be applied to nearly all forms of professions. We expect doctors, school teachers, pilots, truck drivers, and auto mechanics to have the skill and knowledge to do what we ourselves can not do. As expected, I often find myself blessed by people who have a skill or knowledge gained out of many years of hard work or school. People who have invested in themselves through forms of education or training are a blessing to others. Now, let us take this principle and apply it to the church.

When a church says something like, “We want to be a blessing to our community,” it generally leads to the start of an outreach ministry. We (Christians) often interpret “being a blessing” as some action we need to do to help others. Doing ministry is very important, but all ministries that seek to be a blessing

to others will always be limited by the depth of character of those who do it. Thus, being a blessing is not just a call to action; it is a call to a deeper walk and fellowship with Jesus. A fellowship with Christ that produces in you a new you shaped by Christ.

Psalm 84:6 describes the world we live in as “the Valley of Baca,” a valley of chaos, mourning, and desolation. But, the Psalm says that those who have set their heart on the Lord turn this valley of Baca into a place of springs. Or, to say this in another way, if you want to bring change to this world of chaos, sorrow, and lost lives, then seek the Lord, and then through you, this world will be blessed (made into a place of springs). This means that for us, the church, to be a blessing to others begins with ourselves knowing and enjoying God’s love. The deeper our souls grow and are filled with the presence of God, the more peace we bring into this world. The greater our righteousness conforms to the righteousness imputed to us by Christ, the more truth is put on display. The greater our joy increases through enjoying God, the more life and light we provide for people in darkness. The more we care for ourselves through seeking the Lord, the more we will truly bless and be God’s vessel of redemption in this world. Let us be a blessing to where God has placed us, and let this blessing begin with our love and desire for God.

From the Board of Finance

Correction to Information Published in December 2020 Newsletter

CARES Act (Tax Law Change)

The CARES Act, which became law in March 2020, included a new tax deduction for individuals:
(1) who made cash donations in 2020 to public charities (such as New Baptist Church), and
(2) who do not itemize deductions for federal income tax purposes.

This deduction reduces the donor’s adjusted gross income and taxable income.
It is limited to \$300 per return (\$150 for those individuals who file married separately).

Death in the Church Family




Dr. Duane Eastman, 80, of Anacortes, WA, passed away Friday, January 8, 2021. In 1951, Duane was saved in a revival. The preacher at the revival announced: "This is no ordinary salvation." The rest of Duane's life and his church and family legacy, have confirmed these words. Duane and Myrna (Reimer) married in September of 1963. Duane began his pastoral ministry in Portland, OR at an inner city Reformed church shortly after that. He pastored several churches throughout Oregon for many years. In 1992, they moved to Anacortes, WA, where he pastored the First Baptist Church of Anacortes for 14 years. During this time, he earned his Doctor of Ministry. Duane officially retired in 2006 after 40 years of full time ministry and enjoyed a long road trip with Myrna and visited 30 states. From 2013 to 2015, Duane served as the Senior Adult Ministry pastor at New Baptist Church. In 2017, he authored his book, *Refining Fire*, sharing the message of God's grace. Duane lived a three-point sermon - love the Word and grace of God, love your family, and love the church. He is survived by his wife, Myrna; sons, Tim, and Trent (Christie); two grandsons, Jacob (Hannah) and Joshua; and one sister, Bertina, as well as many, many friends who loved him and will miss him dearly.
