
Introductory Note - On the last Sunday in June, the sanctuary cross was installed at New Baptist Church. The sermon passage for that Sunday was 2 Samuel 8 and Psalm 40. Audy Perry has written a beautiful personal reflection on these passages. I hope you take the time to read his reflection reproduced below and find encouragement in it.

The key though is vs 4 and 5-

"But you have raised a banner for those who fear you— a rallying point in the face of attack. Now rescue your beloved people. Answer and save us by your power."



Life is hard work, messy and often painful - but amazing! 2 Samuel, chapter 8 recounts many victories that the Lord gave King David. It describes brutal and bloody battle but I am often tempted to just skim over those parts and focus on sentences within the brutality like "so the Lord made David victorious wherever he went (vs 6 and 14)" and assume David just glided through these battles with full confidence and ease because the Lord was on his side. However, Psalm 60 is given to us as a beautiful, raw insight into David's heart and mind during these exact victories -



David never gave up trusting that God could and would provide. He goes on to claim the things he knew God had promised (vs 6-8) and asks God for specific help in the battles to come (vs 9-11) acknowledging that without God all striving is "useless". In Vs 12, through all the pain and uncertainty of his circumstances, David is still able to conclude triumphantly that "With God's help we will do mighty things!"

How about us? We look at others who seem to be "victorious wherever they go" and assume that their life is easy. Or we look at our own battles and see them as

God's rejection and anger. In the middle of God leading us to victory, we sometimes all feel instead that everything is about to come unglued, the wheels are coming off and that it is all going to fall apart. Don't give up. Like David, We must steadfastly cling to God's promises, continually ask for His guidance, trusting Him for the victory so that, like David, we may triumphantly proclaim that with God's help (through the mess, pain and loss) we can do mighty things!

"You have rejected us, O God, and broken our defenses. You have been angry with us; now restore us to your favor. You have shaken our land and split it open. Seal the cracks, for the land trembles. You have been very hard on us, making us drink wine that sent us reeling." Psalms 60:1-3 NLT

David thought the whole thing was falling apart in the midst of God's victorious provision. In the midst of God's victorious procession, David felt pain and loss; he felt everything was shaking, trembling and reeling out of control (ever felt that way?)

She is currently studying Kanji (over 60,000 characters!!!). They hope to learn between 1,000-2,000 characters by the time class is over.



Most recently they played at Pickaway Correctional Institute. They had 23 first time decisions made to follow Christ, 31 rededicated their lives to Christ and 2 are still considering. Their next game is coming up in Morgantown.

Thoughts from Pastor Robin

I will turn 75 on my birthday this month. For some of you that is nothing, but for others I am ancient. As I reflected on that, my thoughts turned to a class I had with Dr. J.I. Packard. The class was titled, "Evangelistic Theology for a Pluralistic Age". The class dealt with the need to develop a theology, built on the authority of scripture, that speaks clearly to our modern culture. Since that time, I have constantly tried to examine my own theology in light of how the current generation views the world. I am struck with the thought that I am from a different world, speaking a different language. In thinking about that, I also remembered a couple of other things that speak to this dilemma and to our opportunity to do ministry in the culture in which we live.

- 1. Len Sweet is a pastor and commentator on the church and modern cultural trends. He has said that if you are older than 38 you are an immigrant in the current culture. As I reflected on that I thought about immigrants. They come from the "old" country with "old" customs and thoughts. They have a work ethic and job skills vastly different from their children. It is true, I am an immigrant in the current American culture.
- 2. I also remembered the following piece I received in an email. It is though worth thinking about even if it makes you feel like an immigrant.

Don't you wish you could go back to the time when.....

Decisions were made by going "eeny-meeny-miney-mo."

Mistakes were corrected by simply exclaiming, "do over!"

"Race issue" meant arguing about who ran the fastest.

Money issues were handled by whoever was the banker in "Monopoly."

Catching fireflies happily occupied an entire evening.

It wasn't odd to have two or three "best" friends.

Being old, referred to anyone over 20.

The net on a tennis court was the perfect height to play volleyball & rules didn't matter.

The worst thing you could catch from the opposite sex was cooties.

It was magic when dad would "remove" his thumb.

It was unbelievable that dodgeball wasn't an Olympic event.

Having a weapon in school, meant being caught with a slingshot.

Nobody was prettier than Mom.

Dad was the strongest man alive.

Scrapes and bruises were kissed and made better.

It was a big deal to finally be tall enough to ride the "big people" rides at the amusement park.

Getting a foot of snow was a dream come true.

Abilities were discovered because of a "double-dog-dare."

When you talk with people about the Lord and our church remember you may be an immigrant speaking a language they do not understand. We must therefore learn their language and translate the gospel into terms their generation understands. Just some thoughts for you to chew on as we seek to do ministry together.

Operation Christmas Child Update from Becky Crouch

In Togo, a nation in West Africa, many were practicing spirit worship and were filled with fear. The need for the hope of the Gospel was great, and shoebox gifts provided the introduction. Many children surrendered their lives to Christ after receiving gift-filled shoeboxes, and 15 started attending The Greatest Journey the following Sunday. The visible transformation of those children inspired the community to come to church. What began as a small discipleship class has grown into a thriving church, full of joyful worship to the Lord.



Our Mission Board has set a goal of 250 boxes to be packed by our church. Over the past 6 years we have averaged 146 so this goal is God size and will only be reached through prayer and contributions by each of our church families. Here is how you can help.

- 1. Pray and ask God how you can be involved.
- 2. Don't wait until November but collect items now. Look for sale items such as flip flops, sunglasses, t-shirts or balls. School supplies will soon be in the store so pick up a few each time you shop. These can be placed in the bin underneath the mission bulletin board at our church.
- 3. Order items online. Items purchased in bulk can be less expensive. A wish list has been created at Amazon and Walmart. You can elect to have the items sent to your house or to the church directly. Check the wish list frequently as more items may be added before November. Scan these QR codes to go to the wish lists.

Notes from Choir Director Karen Dailey

The song "How Firm a Foundation" first appeared in print in 1820 under the title "Exceedingly Great and Precious Promises". It has stood the test of time being over 200 years old despite no one knowing for sure the author. According to Then Sings My Soul, 150 of the World's Greatest Hymn Stories by Robert J Morgan, the song originally had seven verses that were based on various biblical promises while today's hymnal version has only four. The first

verse establishes the theme of the hymnist's message based on God's promise in 2 Corinthians 12:9 "My grace is sufficient for you...". God's Word is, indeed, a sufficient and firm foundation for our faith. The author then selected more of God's promises and converted these into the verses. Verse two is restating Isaiah 41:10 "Fear not, for I am with you; be not dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you, yes, I will help you, I will uphold you with My righteous right hand." Verse three is paraphrasing Isaiah 43:2 "When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overflow you. When you walk through the fire, you shall not be burned, nor shall the flame scorch you." Verse four is emphasizing Hebrews 13:5 "For He Himself has said, 'I will never leave you nor forsake you." Such beautiful promises that are restated in a great hymn of our faith.

I am excited about the many ways God met with the community and our students on this trip and look forward to seeing how the question "how does this impact the way you live when we get home?" answered in years to come! I encourage you to ask the students who went what they learned or experienced!

This summer the youth continue to learn about the **armor of God** in **Ephesians 6** as we have **"Squad Wars"** every Wednesday night from 6-7:30pm. There are themed games, lessons, and discussions each week and if you have a student in 6th-12th grade they are invited to join us!

In *The God Who Stays*, contemporary Christian musician Matthew West writes about the pandemic's fear-filled early days. After his concert tour was abruptly canceled in March 2020, he rode to an airport "feeling utterly hopeless about a world that was spinning out of control."

Then Arthur, his ride-share driver, began singing along to the radio — and the song happened to be West's "The God Who Stays." West joined in, jokingly asking how he sounded. "Not so good," Arthur replied, not knowing West's identity. "You keep trying."

The driver shared how those lyrics uplifted him during life's difficulties, and West later recalled that conversation during lockdown, while wondering where God was. The musician realized he had "settled for a socially distant relationship with the One who is nearer than I dare to believe, closer than the air I breathe." But West pictured "God running toward me with open arms like the prodigal's father," and he resolved to keep trying — and to grow closer to the God who always stays.
